**Résumé:** BACKGROUND: The APIC (Citizen Accompaniment Project for Community Integration) is an innovative program that seeks to increase the community integration of people with a traumatic brain injury (TBI) by offering the support of an accompanying citizen (AC) in the accomplishment of significant life activities. OBJECTIVE: This article aims to better define the AC's role in this process, by underlining the mental health risks they face, the strategies they use, and the impacts the role has on their own lives. METHODS: This qualitative study is based on the analysis of interviews conducted with the AC following the first year of implementation. The data is part of a larger project aimed at the implementation and evaluation of APIC program. The data were analysed according to the rules of thematic content analysis, which encourages grouping main ideas into categories. This is an iterative process allowing for the constant emergence of new categories during the analysis. RESULTS: Accompaniment is full of joys and positive moments for the AC and participants. However, some difficult situations are encountered and the AC are constantly faced with challenges and constraints. The emerging study themes are as follows: the environment, the characteristics of the person accompanied, the AC's personal limits, and the ambiguities in the accompanier-accompanied relationship. CONCLUSIONS: Five principles drawn from the results will help oversee this practice more efficiently and limit the mental health risks of accompaniers. These findings may permit further development of this type of program for people living with disabilities.

**Résumé:** Urban living environments are known to influence human well-being and health. The literature on environmental equity focuses especially on the distribution of nuisances and resources, which, because of the unequal spatial distribution of different social groups, leads to an increased exposure to risks or to less access to beneficial elements for certain populations. Little work has been done on the multidimensionality of different environmental burdens and the lack of resources in some urban environments. This article has two main objectives. The first objective is to construct an environmental equity index that takes into consideration seven components of the urban environment (traffic-related pollutants, proximity to major roads and highways, vegetation, access to parks, access to supermarkets, and the urban heat island effect). The second objective is to determine whether groups vulnerable to different nuisances --namely, individuals under fifteen years old and the elderly -- and those who tend to be located in the most problematic areas according to the environmental justice literature (i.e., visible minorities and low-income populations) are affected by environmental inequities associated with the application of the composite index at the city block level. The results obtained by using four statistical techniques show that, on the Island of Montreal, low-income persons and, to a lesser extent, visible minorities are more frequently located in city blocks close to major roads and with higher concentrations of NO<sub>2</sub> and less vegetation. Finally, the

environmental equity index is significantly lower in areas with high concentrations of low-income populations in comparison with the wealthiest areas.

**Résumé:** This article explores the idea of resonant listening in relation to aging and memory loss. Resonance is put into conversation with three pieces of sound art created by or with older adults grappling with changes in memory. The first two works discussed, Sounds of Forgetting and Turning, were created from recordings of conversations between one of the authors, Aynsley Moorhouse, and her father, Dr. John Moorhouse. The third composition, Fried Brains, is a two-minute piece created by Louise Jacks and Enid Anderson, two older women. Shifting away from narratives that reduce aging and memory changes to a series of tragic losses from a golden time in one's life, these three works assert the value of ongoing expressive capacity and collaboration. They point to the ways in which, through sound, we may gradually learn to destigmatize dementia and changes in memory to create connections between neurotypical and neurologically atypical people.

**Résumé:** ABSTRACT Building upon earlier studies on ageism in the media and the polarised ageism framework, this contribution compares the prevalence of three forms of ageism – intergenerational, compassionate and new ageism – in four Canadian and American newspapers. The analysis has three objectives. First, it adapts the polarised ageism framework to a comparative case study to assess its usefulness beyond Canada. Second, it analyses which form of ageism occurs more frequently in the coverage of ageing-related stories in Canadian or American newspapers. Third, it studies the importance of the political orientation of news media across both countries by comparing the portrayal of ageing-related stories in conservative and liberal newspapers. Core findings include the presence of a stronger focus on intergenerational ageism in American and conservative newspapers and more frequent prevalence of compassionate ageism in Canada and liberal newspapers. American newspapers also typically employ more pejorative and sensational language.

**Résumé:** For older drivers, in-vehicle technology offers much potential to improve safety and increase longevity of retaining both licensure and community mobility. However, little is known about how older drivers perceive Advanced Vehicle Technologies (AVTs) based on everyday driving experience. Interviews with 35 older drivers (20 men; 15 women) aged 60–85 who owned a vehicle with at least two AVTs (e.g., back-up camera, lane departure warning) were conducted to explore the meanings that older drivers assigned to AVTs and motivations for use, including whether age-related functional changes were part of their automobile purchase decision. Findings indicate that age-related changes are not a primary reason for why older adults seek out AVTs, but they still perceived and experienced AVTs to counteract age-related changes in driving performance based upon changes they felt occurring within the body. Older drivers also described AVTs as generating a sense of comfort behind-the-wheel. Comfort with

this technology was equated with convenience, ease of use, and increased feelings of safety. Discussion emphasizes how assessments of the quality of driving performance and value of technology occur in relation to an aging body.

**Résumé:** AbstractObjective Research has shown that employed women are more prone to depression than men, but the pathways linking gender to depression remain poorly understood. The aim of this study was to examine how work and family conditions operated as potentially gendered antecedents of depression. It evaluated more specifically how differences in depressive symptoms in women and men could be explained by their differential vulnerability and exposure to work and family conditions, as well as by the mediating role of work-to-family conflict (WFC) and family-to-work conflict (FWC). Methods Data were collected in 2009–2012 from a sample of 1935 employees (48.9% women) nested in 63 workplaces in the province of Quebec (Canada). Data were analyzed with multilevel path analysis models to test for the differential exposure hypothesis, and stratified by gender to test for the differential vulnerability hypothesis. Results Results supported both hypothesizes, but only WFC played a mediating role between work-family stressors and depression. Regarding the vulnerability hypothesis, WFC was more strongly associated with women depressive symptoms, and the magnitude of the association between family income and WFC was stronger for women. Overall, the differential exposure hypothesis seemed to reach a greater empirical support. After accounting for work and family stressors as well as WFC, differences in depressive symptoms in women and men were no longer significantly, as WFC, working hours, irregular work schedule and skill utilization acted as mediators. WFC associated with higher depressive symptoms and skill utilization with lower depressive symptoms. WFC related to higher working hours and irregular work schedule. Compared to men, women reported higher WFC, but lower working hours, less irregular work schedule and lower skill utilization at work. Conclusion Women's higher rate of depression is intrinsically linked to their different social experiences as shaped by a gendered social structure and gendered organizations.

**Résumé:** Despite ageist stereotypes about older people's abilities to engage with information and communication technologies, grandparents are increasingly engaged with digital media. Grandmothers, in particular, are primarily responsible for using of web-based services to communicate with their children and grandchildren (Quadrello et al., 2005). Photos and news from children and grandchildren, especially grandbabies, act as important incentives for grandparents to go online. The purpose of the study, therefore, was to investigate how grandmothers use Facebook to facilitate family communication with children and grandchildren who move far away from home. Semi-structured interviews were conducted with grandmothers living in Romania and Canada, having a Facebook account and relevant family members (children or grandchildren) far from home. Three themes emerged from the data indicating: 1) the tendency to switch between different platforms to facilitate family communication; 2) the relative passive use of Facebook, focusing on photos and quotations as content that trigger emotions; 3) that Facebook usage is influenced by social norms around decency and privacy. Findings suggest that family relationships play a central role in grandmothers' motivations and behaviours surrounding Facebook use.

**Résumé:** Home care professionals are well positioned to witness or prevent older adult mistreatment in the community. Screening efforts are important because most victims will not easily come forth. Two Canadian local community service centers implemented a systematic screening procedure within preexisting individual clinical supervision sessions to support social workers and improve detection of mistreatment. The aim of this pilot project was to assess fidelity, acceptability, and feasibility of the new procedure. Qualitative data was collected using individual interviews with two clinical supervisors, one focus group with eight social workers and content transcribed from 15 supervision sessions. It was estimated that 400 clients were screened for older adult mistreatment using this new procedure. Results showed the procedure was judged acceptable because it sensitized social workers to risk factors, gave them time to reflect upon and discuss probable cases with their clinical supervisor. Nonetheless, participants did not use the designated statistical code in the new procedure to document mistreatment situations. Feasibility was mainly challenged by the fact that screening for older adult mistreatment competes with other organizational priorities. Future initiatives must develop strategies to counteract those barriers.

**Résumé:** This contribution analyses the importance given to gender in articles related to caregiving for older adults in five francophone newspapers ( Le Soir, Le Devoir, Figaro, Libération and La Presse ) across three countries (Belgium, France and Canada). Out of the 254 articles in our sample, less than a fifth (49) made any mention of gender. A closer analysis of the gender related contributions reveal that only 18 articles devote more than a line to the interaction between gender and caregiving activities and its multiple socio-economic consequences. This is highly surprising since women provide the bulk of caregiving efforts and are the ones facing difficulties due to the lack of governmental actions to assist with these functions. These consequences are well documented in the scientific literature and feature caregiving burnout, loss of employment and economic insecurity. This contribution features an analysis and some extracts from the 18 articles in question.

**Résumé:** A high level of road traffic noise during the night can alter individuals' wellbeing. The first objective of this paper is to determine whether the groups that are most vulnerable to road traffic noise, namely children under 15 years old and people aged 65 and over, and the groups most likely to experience high levels of nuisance, namely visible minorities and low-income individuals, are affected by environmental inequities with regard to road traffic noise during the night. The second objective is to identify the sectors where the mean level of noise surpasses the 55 dB(A) tolerance threshold established by the World Health Organization. The methodology for estimating the level of nocturnal road traffic noise is based on a combination of elements of the road and urban environments. All of these parameters have been considered in calculating road traffic noise in the most densely inhabited portion of the Island of Montreal. The results of the statistical tests show that the groups selected on the basis of age are not affected by any environmental inequities. However, areas with more low-income individuals and visible minorities are more likely to be characterized by higher levels of road traffic noise when compared with the rest of the population.

Results underline the importance of understanding the interaction of individual and environmental factors when looking to support the participation of seniors with disabilities.

**Résumé:** ABSTRACT This research examines obstacles faced by older people living with HIV in maintaining their significant social ties (family, friends) in the light of a double theoretical framework, inter-sectionality and the course of life. Favoring a qualitative methodology, this research is based on in-depth, semi-directed interviews with a diverse sample of 38 people living with HIV, aged 50-73 years. Analysis reveals that a significant proportion of participants have experienced ruptures or deterioration of close ties with intimates at the level of family or friends. The principal factors behind these difficulties are the past and present stigma associated with HIV and /or other social positions, long-term effects of HIV, issues related to aging and crosscutting effects of HIV and aging. RÉSUMÉ La présente recherche se propose d'examiner les obstacles rencontrés par les personnes âgées vivant avec le VIH dans le

maintien de leurs liens sociaux significatifs (famille, amis) à la lumière d'un double cadre théorique, l'intersectionnalité et le parcours de vie. **Résumé:** (Extrait du site de l'OMS) "Aujourd'hui pour la première fois dans l'histoire, la majorité des populations peuvent espérer vivre jusqu'à 60 ans et au-delà. Combinée à une baisse marquée des taux de fécondité, cette augmentation de l'espérance de vie conduit à un vieillissement rapide des populations partout dans le monde. Il s'agit là d'un profond bouleversement et ses répercussions sont considérables.

Une action globale de santé publique en matière de vieillissement de la population est nécessaire de toute urgence. Cela nécessitera des changements fondamentaux, et pas uniquement dans ce que nous réalisons, mais dans la façon dont nous concevons le vieillissement lui-même.

Le Rapport mondial sur le vieillissement et la santé définit un cadre d'action pour favoriser le vieillissement en bonne santé, construit autour du nouveau concept des capacités fonctionnelles. Cela exigera une transformation des systèmes de santé s'éloignant des modèles curatifs basés sur la maladie pour préconiser la prestation de soins intégrés et centrés sur la personne âgée."
